


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
A mirror is sometimes seen as a symbol of vanity. In the next poet that you will read, the poet uses a peacock to symbolize vanity.




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- The word 'seen' is a homophone. How does the meaning here differ from the word 'scene' in this sentence: So Mei sang her song and she read from a scene."
